## REMARKS

Bur. of Mines, B. C., Ann. Rep. 1887, p. 278.

In 1887, this creek was industriously worked for about a mile from its mouth, and paid from \$3 to \$4 per day to the individual.

"A Chinaman working for a company on Boulder Creek unearthed a nugget of the value of \$900. This was concealed and sold to Wells, Fargo & Company, bankers, Victoria, who placed it on exhibition in their window that winter." (B.C. Rep., 1898.)

Boulder creek is a tributary of Otter creek and flows into the N. end of Otter lake from the west.

"The stream was mined for a mile and a half above its mouth, and gave good returns in gold, though it yielded no platinum. The last work done here was in 1909, when a few Chinamen worked over some of the old gravel dumps." (G.S.C., Memoir 26.)

*Boulder CK - Several companies have made small  
 workings, and still hold on to their locations; the work  
 is heavy, the gold is coarse, and the shallow gravel pays  
 best. Collins' Gulch, on the other side of the river,  
 paid wages, but is about worked out. One  
 piece weighed 1 3/4 ounces.*
